

The DC Ramblers Motorcycle Club originated in 1937 and the original members rode sidecar outfits delivering goods for business establishments in the Nation's Capital. In 1947 the D.C. Ramblers Motorcycle Club was incorporated in the state of Maryland. During the 50's and 60's, club members wore uniforms and participated in numerous parades. In the early 50's we purchased 23 acres of land in Ft Washington, Maryland and built our Clubhouse there in 1956.

The D.C. Ramblers were active in sponsoring motorcycle races all over MD and the surrounding states. Many of the Mid-Atlantic States motorcycle race events were completely under the purview of D.C. Ramblers M/C, we did it all from Flagman to Referee.

Also in the 1950's the DC Ramblers M/C were featured in a TV special produced to promote a better image for motorcyclists

In 1985, the Club hosted the fall rally which proceeds were used to restore Ellis Island. Since 1991, the D.C. Ramblers have been active in supporting Rolling Thunder, the annual parade in Washington to honor and raise awareness for our nations POWs and MIA military members. For eight years the Club hosted the American Pride Yellow Ribbon Ride, the largest contingent of riders to join the Rolling Thunder Procession at the Pentagon. In recent years the D.C. Ramblers has been the host for the Annual dinner for the 200-300 veterans and supporters from the group known as the "Run for the Wall". This ride starts in California and travels cross-country to participate in Rolling Thunder.

Annually we hold fund raisers and make donations to various organizations including the Charles County Catholic Charities Woman's Shelter, the Charlotte Hall Veterans Home and the Walter Reed Medical Center. The DC Ramblers continues to support our Veterans and our community.

The DC Ramblers has a membership of about 25 active members that meet at least twice a month with our regular meetings being the 2nd and 4th Wednesday. Since selling our club house in Ft Washington in 2011 we have been meeting at the American Legion in Hughesville. Our new home at 16763 Prince Frederick Rd will become the private meeting place where our membership will meet weekly and will be accessible to only members and their guests.

Although originally calling our home county Prince Georges, we've always managed and invested our finances in Waldorf and look forward to our move to Charles County. We rely on donations, union dues and fund raising as our means of financial support. Our members range in ages from the 30's up to the 80's. For over 75 years we have maintained a strict Constitution and Bylaws that keep our membership loyal and committed. The purchase of our new home will be a cash deal without financing and I feel our move to Charles County will prove us to be a good neighbor and asset to Charles County.
