Federal

- **Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA)** provides a full listing of all Federal programs available to State and local governments (including the District of Columbia); federally-recognized Indian tribal governments; Territories (and possessions) of the United States; domestic public, quasi- public, and private profit and nonprofit organizations and institutions; specialized groups; and individuals. - **Grants.gov** An electronic grant application system. Most federal grants can be found and/or applied for on-line at this site. Some applications may be electronically submitted at the funding agency's website. Link: <http://www.grants.gov/>
- **Grants Management Common Rule** On March 12, 1987, the President directed the Federal grant making agencies to issue a grants management common rule to adopt government-wide terms and conditions for grants to States and local governments. In 1988, OMB revised Circular A-102 to include guidance to Federal agencies on matters not covered by the grants management common rule. The attachments to Circular A-102 were replaced by the grants management common rule.

It is important for a grantee to review the regulations of their Federal awarding agency. Therefore, the generic text of the common rule is not provided on this site but a link to the chart to locate the codified common rule for a particular Federal agency can be found on this federal government web page as well as other useful links. - **Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA #)** The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance website contains the most current published information on federally funded program and the number assigned to the program. Link: <https://www.cfda.gov/>
- **Central Contractor Registry (CCR)** was the primary supplier database for the U.S. Federal government. The CCR collected data from suppliers, validated and stored this data, and disseminated it to various government acquisition agencies. Any organization wishing to receive grant funds from the federal government is required to register and receives a CAGE Code. The CCR system along with Federal Agency Registration (FedReg), the Online Representations and Certifications Application (ORCA), and the Excluded Parties List System (EPLS), migrated into the new System for Award Management, or SAM. Moving the CCR system to SAM is part of the first phase to combine eight federal procurement systems and the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) into one new system. SAM will streamline and integrate processes, reduce the number of passwords to remember, reduce the number of systems to interact with, eliminate data redundancies by sharing data across the award life cycle, and reduce costs while providing improved capability.

Q - How do I determine if my organization has a cognizant agency or an oversight agency?
A - According to the OMB Circular A – 133 (http://www.whitehouse.gov/sites/default/files/omb/assets/a133/a133_revised_2007.pdf),

Subpart D -- Federal Agencies and Pass - Through Entities §____.400 Responsibilities. If the amount of Federal Awards expended is more than \$25 million (\$50 million for fiscal years ending after December 31, 2003) a year and includes direct awards, your organization will have a cognizant agency. If the amount of Federal awards expended is \$25 million (\$50 million for fiscal years ending after December 31, 2003) or less, or includes no direct awards, your organization will have an oversight agency.

Q - How do I determine the Federal cognizant agency?

A - Cognizant (COG) agencies are determined by the Federal Audit Clearinghouse. A listing of current cognizant agency assignments is in the "Cog List Report" available in Specialized Reports (<http://harvester.census.gov/sac/dissemin/reports.html>). The following Cognizant Reference Chart shows the Federal award expenditure threshold for Cognizance each audit year and the audit year used for Cognizant agency determination.

Q - How do I determine the Federal oversight agency?

A - The oversight agency is the Federal agency that awarded the greatest amount of direct awards expended. If no direct awards were expended, the Federal agency that awarded the greatest amount of indirect awards expended is assigned oversight responsibility. Oversight agencies are identified by the Federal Audit Clearinghouse in the online database based on the expenditures reported in the year of the audit.

The Federal oversight (or cognizant) status and Federal agency for an audit is listed at the bottom of page two of completed Form SF-SAC data for that audit. Completed Form SF-SAC data for any completed audit can be found by searching the Single Audit database.

- **D-U-N-S** Data Universal Numbering System, abbreviated as DUNS or D-U-N-S, is a system developed and regulated by Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) that assigns a unique numeric identifier, referred to as a DUNS number, to a single business entity. The Office of Management and Budget, a United States federal agency, announced in the June 27, 2003 issue of the Federal Register (68 FR 38402) that a DUNS number would be required for all grant applicants for new or renewal awards submitted on or after October 1, 2003. The DUNS number supplements other identifiers, such as the EIN, and is required whether the application is made electronically or on paper.² Link: <http://fedgov.dnb.com/webform>

- **Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA)** The FFATA Subaward Reporting System (FSRS) is the reporting tool Federal prime awardees (i.e. prime contractors and prime grants recipients) use to capture and report subaward and executive compensation data regarding their first-tier subawards to meet the FFATA reporting requirements. Prime grant awardees will report against sub-grants awarded. Direct recipients of awards of \$25,000 or more will be required to report award information on any first-tier subawards totaling \$25,000 or more. The sub-award information entered in FSRS will then be displayed on www.USASpending.gov associated with the prime award furthering Federal spending transparency. The application would therefore be sent to the State Clearinghouse. The primary mission of the Clearinghouse is to ensure that financial and non-financial assistance projects operating within Maryland are consistent with State and local laws, regulations, and guidelines. This is accomplished by circulating requests for financial assistance, plans and development projects to State, regional and local public officials, to ensure that requests, plans, and projects are consistent with public policy. - **System for Award Management (SAM)** SAM is combining federal procurement systems and the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance into one new system. This consolidation is being done in phases. The first phase of SAM includes the functionality from the following systems:
 - Central Contractor Registry - CCR was the primary supplier database for the U.S. Federal government. The CCR collected data from suppliers, validated and stored this data, and disseminated it to various government acquisition agencies. Any organization wishing to receive grant funds from the federal government is required to register and receives a CAGE Code.
 - Federal Agency Registration (Fedreg) – Issued each Federal working day, the Federal Register provides a uniform system for publishing Presidential documents, regulatory documents with general applicability and legal effect, proposed rules, notices, and documents required to be published by statute.
 - Online Representations and Certifications Application – ORCA was the primary Government repository for contractor submitted representations and certifications required to conduct business with the Federal government.
 - Excluded Parties List System (EPLS) – the EPLS identifies those parties excluded from receiving Federal contracts, certain subcontracts, and certain types of Federal financial and non-financial assistance and benefits.
